Saline High School services a school district of 100 square miles including the city of Saline and surrounding township areas with a population of about 27,000. The total district population for 2018-19 was 5421. The city is located in Southeastern Michigan, 10 miles south of Ann Arbor within close community distance to the University of Michigan, Eastern Michigan University, Washtenaw Community College, and Concordia College. The school system includes four elementary schools, a middle school and a high school.

The high school consists of grades 9-12 with an enrollment of approximately 1800 students. A comprehensive curriculum is offered including more than 200 courses offered in the building, which includes 17 Advanced Placement courses. The South and West Washtenaw Consortium provided 19 career technical programs for juniors and seniors.

SCHOOL DAY: Saline High School operates on a trimester schedule which includes 5 class periods / 71 minutes in length each trimester. Each one period class earns 0.50 credit for a total of 7.5 credits possible in 1 year.

ACCREDITATION: North Central Association since 1960.

CURRICULUM: A comprehensive curriculum is offered including traditional courses in English, mathematics, science, social studies, world language, and career technology education. Honors/accelerated courses are offered in:

English 9, English 10, Advanced Algebra, Precalculus, and Intro to AP Sciences. Pre-vocational courses are offered in grades 9 and 10, followed by career technical courses through the South and West Washtenaw Consortium. The CEEB Advanced Placement curriculum is taught in Biology, Chemistry, Comparative Government, Computer Science, Economics, English Language and Literature, Environmental Science, Government, Calculus AB and BC, Physics, Psychology, Statistics, Studio Art-Drawing, Studio Art-3D Design and United States History.

EXTRA-CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES: Clubs, athletics, musical groups, academic games/competitions, yearbook, social activities, class functions and student council are broad in scope and meet NCA standards

STAFF: Consists of 88 teachers, 4 counselors, 1 student resource officer, 11 paraeducators, 5 paraprofessionals, 8 custodians, 4 secretaries, 4 assistants, 16 food service employees, 1 technical support and 5 administrators.

GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS FOR THE CLASS OF 2020: Twenty-seven credits are required, including 4 in English, 4 in mathematics, 3 in science, 3 in social studies, 1 in physical education, .5 in health, 1 in technology, 1 in visual, performing or applied arts, and 2 in world language. Students are encouraged to diversify their educational programs by taking a broad range of courses in the career technical, fine arts, business, physical education and college preparatory curriculum.

GRADE POINT/RANK: Grade point average and rank are based on all classes taken for credit using a 4 point scale. Grades in AP courses are weighted based on a 5 point scale.
